is image everything for many people in our culture image and images are everything americans spend hours watching television but rarely finish a good book words are quickly losing their appeal arthur hunt sees this trend as a direct assault on christianity he warns that by exalting imagery we risk becoming mindless pagans our thirst for images has dulled our minds so that we lack the biblical and mental defenses we need to resist pagan influences what about paganism hunt contends that it never died in modern western culture image based media just brought it to the surface again sex violence and celebrity worship abound in our culture driving a mass media frenzy reminiscent of pagan idolatry this book is a clear warning that the church is being cut off from its word based heritage and that we are open to abuse by those who exploit the image but neglect the word thoughtful readers will find this a challenging call to be critical about the

images bombarding our sense and to affirm that the word is everything

reading the phenomenology of spirit through a linguistic lens jeffrey reid provides an original commentary on hegel s most famous work beginning with a close analysis of the preface where hegel himself addresses the book s difficulty and explains his tortured language in terms of what he calls the speculative proposition reid demonstrates how every form of consciousness discussed in the phenomenology involves and reveals itself as a form of language elucidating hegel s speculative proposition which consists of the reversal of the roles of the subject and predicate in such a way that the copula of the proposition becomes the lively arena of dialogical ambiguity and hermeneutical openness this book offers new onto grammatical readings of every chapter of the phenomenology not only does this bring a new understanding to hegel s foundational text but the linguistic approach further allows reid to unpack its complexity by relating it to contemporary contexts that share the same language structures that we discover in hegel amongst many others this includes hegel s account of sense certainty and the critique of the immediacy of consumer culture today

by means of a kierkegaardian critique of postmodernism ronald l hall argues that the postmodernist flirtation with kierkegaard ignores the existential import of his thought word and spirit offers a novel interpretation of kierkegaard s conception of the self according to which spirit is essentially linked to the speech act in an extended interpretation of kierkegaard s either or hall uses insights from austin wittgenstein polanyi and poteat to fill out and explicate kierkegaard s views in the context of modern language philosophy the enriched concept of the speech act represented by the hebrew idea of dabhar frames hall s critique of irony romanticism don giovanni faust the demonic music and ultimately postmodernisim in a kierkegaardian mode the result of the modern suspicion of speech hall concludes is a demonic musical spiritlessness

how reproductive justice birth workers and queer parents build kinships and care relations that resist oppressive structures anti trans policies that restrict the boundaries of gender reproduction and family formation are a dangerous form of reproductive injustice with grave impacts on trans nonbinary and gender nonconforming people in doing gender justice shui yin sharon yam and natalie fixmer oraiz explore the intricate intersections of gender race and reproductive politics to illuminate how language and care practices can be reshaped to promote transformations at the structural level and in small everyday ways only by enacting justice oriented forms of reproductive care and relations yam and fixmer oraiz contend could activists and health care workers challenge the dominant affective and ideological investments in binary gender and its complicity in white supremacy set against a backdrop of relentless anti trans legislation and attacks on bodily autonomy this groundbreaking work shares the lived experiences and advocacy of queer and trans parents gender inclusive birth workers and reproductive justice activists through rich storytelling and rigorous analysis of ethnographic data and cultural artifacts the authors highlight innovative tactics that trans and nonbinary people use to dismantle oppressive systems and create a more expansive definition of family and kinship organized to examine how the dominant gender system influences discursive and cultural practices in multiple contexts this book amplifies rhetorical inventions and tactics deployed by reproductive justice advocates birth workers and queer people who have created trans inclusive spaces for reproduction and family making doing gender justice offers a compelling vision for a world where all forms of family and kinship are possible and where reproductive justice can be advanced in a deeply intersectional and coalitional way

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
